Message from Chairperson

Nepal has been facing many problems and challenges from long decades. Not only the political instability, poverty and illiteracy but also the lack of better opportunity, discrimination, and geographical structural, natural disaster are playing the major role for the underdevelopment of our country.



These causes are also the root cause of human trafficking. For sexual slavery, forced labor, it is commonly done. Because of the globalization human trafficking is spreading in the name of foreign employment, organ transplant, in the name of marriage, through tourist, students and visit visa in the various sector including domestic worker and entertainment sector. Drawing on the experiences about the case of human trafficking, it occurs mainly in 3 areas; cross-border trafficking beyond India; cross-border trafficking to India and internal trafficking mainly in entertainment enterprises, brick kilns, embroidering industries, and streets. Now Nepal is not only the resource country it is developed as transit and destination as well.

This year, by the 7.8 magnitude earthquake on 25 April and the 7.3 quake on 12 May has created the very tragic impact on the life of Nepali people. The Government of Nepal confirmed over 500,000 houses was destroyed and 8,700 people killed by the earthquakes and injured thousands of people. People lost their life, lost their parents, family members, relatives, houses and livelihood options. It was provided food and non-food item as relief materials and there was underestimated of the high risk of sexual violence and trafficking of girls, women, and children. Shakti Samuha begins its work by providing relief materials and awareness raising program on the risk of human trafficking and such kind of violence. From government, civil society and from international community begin to support the affected community by providing relief support including psycho-social support but there were the high chances of trafficking by those support providers as well in the name of child adoption and in the name of religion. To minimize the risk of trafficking Shakti Samuha and other organization with coordination with government begin to establish Child Safe Space, Women Safe Space, Temporary Learning Centre, Child Protection and Information Booth and other different camps to provide different support through on emergency period. Shakti Samuha also raised the risk of human trafficking after earthquake through the national and international Media.

Shakti Samuha, globally the first organization established and running by trafficking survivors and has been working since 1996. After the earthquake, Shakti Samuha focused its activities in all 21 districts including 14 earthquake affected districts and provided different support during the emergency period. Besides the tragic moments, Shakti Samuha becomes able to achieve **the French Republic and Human Rights Award, Asia Democracy and Human Rights Award(Personal)** and **Women Leadership Achievement Award(Personal)**. Those awards always remind us our responsibilities to eliminate Human Trafficking.

Still, Shakti Samuha is trying to reach as much as possible to overcome these challenges through the support of all stakeholders and Nepal Government. Nepal Government has been playing the

effective role and coordinating all the civil society to protect girls and women from the different kinds of violence including trafficking after the earthquake. We always appreciate and express our gratefulness to the regular support of Nepal Government, Government bodies and system, donors-partners, media-journalists, all stakeholders, human rights activists and all supporters. We would like to thank board members, advisory committee management committee, all members and staffs of regular hard work and creative efforts. At last, I am very thankful to the team who involved bringing this annual report 2015.

Introduction

Shakti Samuha "Power Group" is the first organization established and run by trafficking survivors worldwide; formed in 1996 AD. It is an organization of human trafficking survivors who are trying to convert tears into power. In the early years, Shakti Samuha faced many difficulties and challenges but was finally registered as a legally independent Non-Government-Organization (NGO) at the District Administration office in Kathmandu in 2000. The goal of Shakti Samuha is to establish a progressive society, devoid of trafficking and other kinds of violence against women. Shakti Samuha has honored by '**Women, Children and Social Welfare Ministry**' and received '**The Ramon Magsaysay Award**' in 2013, **French Republic Human Rights Award (2015)** a testimonial of Shakti team's hard efforts and invaluable contributions and also some others national and international awards.

History of Shakti Samuha

In 1996, 500 girls and women were rescued from slavery in Indian brothels during widespread police raids. Among these were 200 Nepalese girls and women. These women were then locked away in remand homes in India, where conditions were as bad as - if not worse - than prison. The Nepalese government was reluctant to bring the women back to Nepal, claiming they would bring HIV into the country with them. In the absence of Government support, seven NGOs (**WOREC Nepal, ABC Nepal, CWIN, Maiti Nepal, Shanti Punarshthapana Griha, Nawa Jyoti and Shtri Shakti**) took the lead in returning and rehabilitating the girls and brought rescued survivors into Nepal where 128 women and girls. After returning Nepal, those organizations divided in different groups and brought them back in seven different safe homes. Among them, 15 survivors decided to go together wherever they stayed.

After few months, Women's Rehabilitation Center (WOREC Nepal) organized 10 days training on "Gender, Reproductive Health Care/Rights Training". During training period, 15 survivors became able to understand that being a trafficked victim was not their fault. Therefore, the team decided to **convert their tears into power**. After completing training, the 15 members united and devoted themselves to fight against human trafficking and formed Shakti Samuha. Then they made a mission to organize and empower trafficking survivors. Though Shakti Samuha

organization was officially registered on 2000 AD but had started awareness program in vulnerable areas from 1996. Since then Shakti Samuha have been working to organize and empower trafficking survivor and awaking vulnerable girls and women. Besides this Shakti Samuha have been advocating to ensure the rights of human trafficking survivors in collaboration and coordination with local, national and international stakeholders and networks.

Vision

Human trafficking affected women and children will be living a **dignified** life in society through **economic** and social **empowerment**

Act as a supportive organization to **involve** affected women and children and those at high risk of human trafficking in anti human trafficking campaign to **ensure & protect** the rights of survivor through **awareness**, organizing and empowering themselves

Ensure and **protect** rights of women and children and those at high risk of human trafficking

Objectives

- To minimize human trafficking through **organizing** and **empowering** women and children affected and those at high risk of human trafficking **involving** them in anti human trafficking campaign

- Income generating and skill based program will be organized to **ensure sustainable livelihood** of human trafficking survivors

Current Working Districts of Shakti Samuha



Program Theme



Activities

A. Prevention

Human trafficking is a serious crime and a grave violation of human rights. It is often regarded as modern day slavery which exploits men, women and children for various purpose, including forced labor and sex. Human trafficking has being a serious issue in our country. It deprives the victim from rights to life, freedom, dignity, and security. We have horrible past experiences that women and girls were trafficked specially in India for commercial sex work but recently, trafficking has been increasing in the name of foreign employment, fake marriage, organ transplant, surrogacy mother, higher education, participation in the cultural program in abroad and due to unsafe migration. Children are being trafficking for many purposes, including sexual exploitation, domestic labour, agricultural and mine work, as well as for sport and for adoption. Even if children are not destined for the sex industry, they are at risk of physically abuse, including sexual abuse. **The root cause of trafficking are multiple and include poverty, lack of employment opportunities, low social status of the girl and women, impunity from prosecution, and a general lack of education and awareness.** Nepal is a country deeply rooted in diverse geographical regions inhabited by different ethnic and caste groups. Various forms of discriminatory practices against women such as early marriage, deprivation of educational and career opportunities for girls and women are still prevalent in Nepal. Such a context adds to their vulnerability towards abuse, exploitation and trafficking. Therefore to alleviate and prevent human trafficking, Shakti Samuha has been raising awareness from the ground level by forming adolescences groups and survivors groups.

At the stage of adolescent age, they can easily believe/trust to unknown/awful person with their falsify promises and adolescent can be at vulnerable situation. Thus Shakti Samuha decided to work with the vulnerable groups with the aim to prevent vulnerability of human trafficking, child sexual abuse and violence. From this, self awareness is raised inside them and members are being mobilized as a peer educator in their respective community. Aged between 12-19 years girls and boys can be the member of adolescent groups. After crossing the age of 19, members can be a group advisor and play a vital role to make a group very active by providing advice for the group's sustainability through their experience. In every monthly meetings different topics has included for the whole year such as caste discrimination and effects caused by it, advantages and disadvantages of communication, local resources and its use, consequences of early marriage, peer education and its importance, drug abuse and the effects caused by it along with the preventive measures, changing trends of human trafficking for safe migration, Gender Based Violence on the monthly meetings at all the adolescent groups.

Key Activities:

1.1 Formation & Mobilization of Adolescence, Survivors and Girls & Women Groups who are working in the Entertainment Sector (Dance, restaurant and other restaurants)

Shakti Samuha has formed 85 adolescences group, 21 human trafficking survivor groups, 2 networks of survivor groups, 3 district level network of adolescent in working 21 districts. Adolescence groups and survivors group have continuously conducting monthly/bio monthly meeting in the respective district. Monthly group meetings of adolescence and survivor are conducted on several topics like new dimension of human trafficking, human slavery, early marriage, women violence, domestic violence, child abuse and sexual exploitation/harassment, current scenario, changing trend of human trafficking and other kinds of social burning issues. Meanwhile, they also include topics of leadership, group saving, importance of being united, problems sharing, ideas of solution and creative thinking to make their community free from social crimes. Groups have been playing a vital role to reduce human trafficking in their community.

Major aims of the group formations are:

- Create a platform to learn, speak, act and talk about their problems and bring a solution within themselves.
- Create a learning environment about the life skills that humans need in every step of life.
- Develop a habit of saving (economic management).

1.2 Training/Orientation:

Shakti Samuha has been organizing several types of training, orientation program, interaction and workshops designed for the adolescent group members, their parents and our beneficiaries to make them clear on the issues of human trafficking, child rights, women rights, violence against women and children and about commercial sexual exploitation of child (CSEC) etc.

1.3 Interaction Program

Shakti Samuha conducted interaction program with Nepal Police, Media and adolescence group members and with their parents regarding the issue of to control human trafficking, their role and responsibility to protect the children from the vulnerability of sexual exploitation and human trafficking.



- **Police Interaction:** District level interaction with police personnel held with the topic; "Our role to control human trafficking/women violence and protection of children" in Nuwakot district.
- **Media Interaction:** Shakti Samuha organized a media interaction in Kathmandu. The objective of interaction was to discuss about the changing trends of human trafficking on current scenario. The media persons also raised the problems on the issues and assured organization to help and fight against human trafficking in the coming future too.
- **Discussion Program:** One day discussion program organized by Shakti Samuha in Bardiya, Guleria. 20 persons participated in the program getting information of safe migration network of woman safe migration network formed in 2012 with objective to develop effective refer and between organization where 8 organization are members and Shakti Samuha is one of the member organization of network and WOREC is the secretariat of network .
- **Interaction between adolescents and their parents:** Interaction program was held in Kathmandu, Sindhupalchowk and Nuwakot district. In the program parents, teachers, social mobilizer, government and health persons were participated. The program was covered the topic of new dimension of human trafficking in the name of foreign employment. Additionally, activity of adolescents in terms of raising awareness among the community people was also discussed during the program. At last, Shakti Samuha was informed by the community people that there is need to increase more adolescent members in the group because most of the youths have been leaving villages for their high education and other opportunities. As we know parents are the first guides of every child. So, parents must be included regarding the awareness about the issues and situations of adolescents. This year we organized interaction with adolescents and their parents at the community level.



1.4 Workshop

This year, Shakti Samuha has been successfully conducted several types of workshop in working districts with different stakeholders, such as media, community, target group (Survivor and adolescence group) and local agencies to raise the issue of human trafficking from local level, maintaining confidentiality rights of survivors and finding solutions for survivors with the possible findings through the workshops. In this year, following workshops have been completed in different working districts.

- ***One day workshop with Nepal Police:*** One day workshop on ‘Our role to protect children’ with police was held in three districts; Banke, Bardiya and Kailali with objective to strengthen child protection system Confidentiality about the survivors, child issues, laws and procedures of child rights, Child Right Convention (CRC) were elaborated during workshop. Also increasing trend of human trafficking in entertainment sectors was discussed in the program. During workshop case filing process and referral mechanism was discussed. Also Shakti Samuha shared some difficult cases in the floor. Police personnel shared that if Shakti Samuha will take process through media to pass the messages and raise awareness then it will add more steps for to prevent child sexual abuse and human trafficking among the children.
- ***One day workshop with District Child Welfare Board (DCWB):*** In the objective to strengthen child protection system, one day workshop with District Child Welfare Board (DCWB) was conducted in Banke, Bardiya and Kailali districts . Opinions of the participants from this workshop are;
 - Children are vulnerable and have poor economic background. Thus if there is possibility then Shakti Samuha needs to provide more education support to the children.
 - Women children office and Shakti Samuha need to go together in the community for the awareness raising activities.
- ***One day workshop with Nepal Police:*** One day workshop with police was held in three districts; Banke, Bardiya and Kailali in the objective to strengthen child protection system and
- Adolescent members have participated in the interaction program on "Security Legislator to regulate and manage personal and business Relations".

1.5 Street Drama Performance



This year, adolescent group members and trafficking survivor members have performed street/stage dramas in their local community of Kathmandu, Sindhupalchowk, Nuwakot, Makwanpur, Bara, Rautahat, Banke, Bardiya and Kailali districts. The drama was presented showing the possibilities of human trafficking through women violence and about

safe migration and foreign employment. Adolescent members actively participated to perform drama.

Street drama performed to spread the message of child sexual abuse. Groups performed drama by wrapping the child sexual abuse activity covering the burning issues of the society and risk factors of unsafe migration and foreign employment. Community people came to see street drama and appreciated adolescent performance and they realized that family members have to play a role to make child friendly environment in the community and prevent them from the sexual abuse and trafficking.



1.6 Counseling:

Human trafficking trend has been changing in the name of foreign employment, due to unsafe migration and lack of proper information. Most of the girls and women are eager to go for the foreign employment in the dream of earning money and luxurious life of aboard. Brokers are giving falsifying promises to the girls and women and providing pre advance of their salary before applying for the visa. Thus without taking proper information about vulnerabilities of human trafficking and violence, they are ready to go. Most of the women and girls come from the Ethnic group in counseling desk to make their passport. Therefore Shakti Samuha established Counseling Desk with aim to provide information about vulnerabilities of human trafficking and protect them from the high risk of human trafficking.

Therefore information about safe migration has been providing them and without acceptable condition permission was not providing those girls and women to issue their passport through the coordination with District Administration Office in Sindhupalchowk, Makwanpur and Bardiya Districts. Up to end of this year **3644** women and girls received information about safe migration in the name of foreign employment. After receiving information, many women and girls returned home without issuing their passport and acknowledged to get capacity building training before applying.

1.7 Other Activities

- **Community Cleaning Program:** Adolescent group's members of Sindhupalchowk, Nuwakot, Kathmandu, Banke, Bardiya and Kailali districts organized community cleaning program in their local community. Activity aim was enclosed to sensitize the people regarding the high risk of human trafficking along their health conditions. Similarly, adolescent members passed the messages to the community people about the important of healthy society to reduce high risk of human trafficking and other kinds of violence through this activity.
- **Cloth Distribution:** Seeing the condition of people living in the area of Pashupatinath temple and Gujeshwori temple adolescent group decided to distribute clothes. Therefore,

with the help of women's group at Maijubaal, Adolescent group Nawa kishori Samuha distributed warm clothes at Pashupatinath and Gujeshwori this year. Four adolescent members involved in this work and a woman from the mothers group was supported to the groups work.

- **Wall Magazine:** Adolescents group prepares wall magazine in quarterly basis every time in Kathmandu district. Each adolescent group prepares it with some information's and some of their creativity which shows their intelligence. The wall magazine is prepared by the mutual understanding of all members in the group and submitted at central office of Shakti Samuha where we utilize them for providing information of the issues to people visiting in the office by reading them. This also helps people know about adolescent groups and their activities at community level.
- 
- **Coordination Meeting:** Coordination meeting with District Program Advisory Committee, District Child Welfare Board, district networks and District Coordinating Committee for Controlling Human Trafficking (DCCHT) with the objective to circulate the information about Shakti Samuha's program and activities, current scenario of human trafficking in community level, it's other key factor, challenges, learning and to discuss about the responsibility of the members and steps to prevent human trafficking and other social issues as well.
 - **Event Celebration for Public Awareness:** National Anti Human Trafficking Day, Women's day, Children Day, Labour Day, Safe Migration Day, International Human Rights Day, 16 Days program against Women Violence, Teej celebration and HIV/AIDS Day are celebrated in our working districts with rally, quiz and interaction program on the different dates.
 - **Documentary show for awareness on Human Training issue:** 2 Video/Documentary show have done in Nuwakot district on prevention and steps on sexual abuse to children and women in the community which followed by discussion on group members how they will fight if such a case happens. Participants got information about violence causes and how violence trends are changed among women in modern time.
 - **Non-Formal Education (NFE):** 160 women among 165 participants of Basamadi and Bastipur VDCs have successfully completed non formal education classes in Makwanpur district.
 - **Women Protection Committee:** In the Makwanpur district, there are two women protection committees and two Women Saving and Credit Co-operatives where 46 women are engaged. They are active in the local community to spread awareness against human trafficking and other social issues. There are 24 monthly meeting in women protection committee.

- **Quiz Competition Program:** Adolescence groups of Bardiya and Kailari organized quiz competitions. Competitions were managed in the aim to circulate the messages about human trafficking and child issues. Questions were designed about human trafficking issues and child issues. After completing competitions, audience and competitor shared that they learned some issues about human trafficking and child abuse.
- **Deusi Vailo Program:** On the occasion of Tihar adolescent group of Bardiya, Banke and Kailai organize a deusi vailo program and also organize a picnic from collect money from deusi vailo(a cultural program in the festival where local songs, folk song and Tihar songs sang and people contribute a gifts-food or money) program.
- **Awareness Activities:** School awareness program has done in the local private and government schools of Banke, Bardiya and Jhapa introducing Shakti Samuha and about human trafficking and different form of slavery and situation might be turns in to vulnerable due to open boarder on the name of job and better earning. Trafficker from different district might use this boarder for trafficking and smuggling girls and women. Similarly, slogans and pamphlets against human trafficking were written and attached on electricity poles and road side.
- To spread the information and awareness on human trafficking Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Child (CSEC), a one week long campaign has been conducted in Kathmandu, Bhaktapur and Lalitpur districts.



1.7 Prevention and response to Trafficking after the disaster of Earthquake

From the massive earth quake of 25th April, more than 8 thousand 200 people have already died and from the earth quake of 12th May, the dead toll has reached 65. According to the data of home ministry, 76,638 people injured after two times earthquake in Nepal but we expect the number to go much higher when the remote villages are reached. The 14 districts of Nepal are the most affected district from massive earthquake namely Sindhupalchwok, Nuwakot, Dhading, Gorkha, Rasuwa, Dolakha, Makwanpur etc and these districts have also recognized as a high risk district for the human trafficking since long times.

In this situation adolescent and youth are in leisure period and they also not have the house to stay safely, they are seeking attention to do any things but they have no option. Additionally, all people including children, adolescent and women are also forced to live under open sky as don't have home to go and live. Sanitation is also other biggest problem. At this moment they are desperately seeking support from any one. Young people are forced to live their origin place and during mobility phase they are being more vulnerable for different kinds of abuses and trafficking. In this



situation, if they will not gets proper information regarding safety they will be in more risk of different kinds of violence including sexual abuse and trafficking. This situation has been adding more high risk of human trafficking among the children and women. According to the data source from the Nepal police 114 women are being trafficked within the seven months from the massive earthquake.

Therefore, Shakti Samuha has started awareness activities in emergency period with distributing relief materials to 1608 households in the most affected districts. Awareness and relief activities done by Shakti Samuha are as follows;

- Involved in relief distribution to the survivors of earthquake in Sindhupalchowk, Nuwakot, Kavre, Makwanpur and Kathmandu districts up to 1608 households.



- Public Awareness activity has conducted in the short term shelter in Kaski in the coordination with local organizations.

Success Story

Sajiya lama is habitant of Makawanpur district. She is 15 years young girl. She is studying in class-7 in Ball Ujjwal Secondary School. She has 4 members in her family. She has a mother, 1 younger sister and 1 elder brother. Her mother name is Sukumaya Lama, and she is also trafficking survivor member of Shakti Samuha. And Sajiya lama is a member of Bihani Adolescents group. She is also facing financial crisis in her family. They just have small poultry farming as a business supported by Shakti Samuha. And also Shakti Samuha has been supported to her as a medical support after giving application to us when she was suffering from severe sickness. Now she is recovered from sickness. With the involvement of Bihani adolescents group Sajiya is participating actively on different kinds of awareness activities of Shakti Samuha such like; Street drama, Quiz Contest Program, rally. In the quiz contest program Sajiya's team has been announced for winner of 1st position. Last time she is performing very well in the drama on the theme of domestic violence and internal trafficking.

B. Protection (Repatriation, Rehabilitation & Re-integration)

Shakti Samuha has been working for the protection of trafficking survivors and children those who are in high risk of human trafficking. We are providing direct shelter support, health support and case management and providing friendly environment to them to overcome the trauma. Shakti Samuha has four shelters homes in Kathmandu, Kaski and Sindhupalchowk districts.

The objectives of the Safe Home and Sangharsashil Mahila Aawash is to rehabilitate and support to the service user for the physical, mental and social well being and rehabilitate and empower, to be self sufficient for their independent and dignified lives through counseling, awareness training and different vocational training and job placement so that they can live independent and dignified lives in the society.

Safe home is the first step of rehabilitation of the trafficking survivors, the children at the risk of trafficking and the children facing sexual abuse and in the process of trafficking. During their stay in the shelter, they are supported with the available services to heal them physically and mentally and prepared them to feel as they could live a very dignified live in the community. After having cured from the problematic stage in the safe home, they will be shifted to Sangharsashil Mahila Aawash, as each shelter has the privilege to keep the beneficiaries within certain timeframe; after they become able to live an independent life or getting support from their family, they move out from the shelter. Similarly, the Emergency Shelter Home in Pokhara has aim to provide protection, support rehabilitation and re-integration of girls who are in high risk of trafficking, sexual abuse, sexual violence; exploitation and emergency support the girls under 18 years.

Women Rehabilitation Center at Sindhupalchowk is also focused for the shelter support and counseling to the trafficking survivors, people who are in high risk of trafficking




Figure 1: Family Counseling/Meeting




Figure 2: Safe home support and re-integration

Altogether 184 beneficiaries have received the services from all four shelter home and 101 beneficiaries have reintegrated including 3 beneficiaries have reintegrated in Urban area, 70 are with their family and 28 beneficiaries are referred to other organizations for long term support.

- ***Psychosocial Counseling***

Psychosocial Counseling has been provided to the 148 beneficiaries in through all shelter homes of Shakti Samuha. Psychosocial counseling is provided to the beneficiaries to overcome the pain and trauma. Counseling is one of the methods to understand their situation and it assists to direct them as per their interest. We have individual and group counseling as per needed.




Figure 3: Total number of service user of Psychosocial Counseling

- ***Health Support***

Most of the trafficked survivors, especially repatriated girls and women of the cross boarder cases are found to have serious health problem including communicable diseases. Thus, Shakti Samuha has been doing medical check-ups as primary support when they come for the shelter support and regular follow-ups, treatments etc. This year 160 beneficiary received health support from Shakti Samuha. The following figure described the data of beneficiaries for the health support;




Figure 4: Total number of Health/Medical Support

- **Trainings**

We are providing different kinds of training including vocational, life skill training etc. to the service users to bring the practical knowledge to enhance their skills and to make them independent, for positive thinking, understanding and giving importance to their own life and how to survive happily etc.

Following data shows that Vocational Training has been provided to 30 beneficiaries through four shelter homes and Life Skill Training has been provided to 27 beneficiaries by three shelter homes except Emergency Shelter Home in Pokhara.




Figure 5: Total number of service user of taking trainings




Figure 6: Total number of job placement




Figure 7: Total number of girls and women receiving education support

From the above figure no 7, there are 18 girls in Safe Home and Sangharsashil Mahila Aawas, 13 girls are in Emergency Shelter Home and 14 girls from Women Rehabilitation Center who succeeded to receive formal education. Similarly, 35 and 37 beneficiaries have received non-formal education from Safe Home & Sangharsashil Mahila Aawas and Emergency Shelter respectively.

- **Legal Support**

From the following figure, our contribution on legal support is 29 in this year. Amongst them, 4 are in Safe Home & Sangharsashil Mahila Aawas, 8 are in Emergency Shelter Home and 17 are in Women Rehabilitation Center.




Figure 8: Total number of Legal Supported

Shakti Hastakala Pvt. Ltd.

The Shakti Hastakala Pvt. Ltd. is registered as a company and it is for girls and women from their safe Shelter in Kathmandu. The girls and women get trained to make jewelry, scarf, Saori shawls, key rings, bracelets, sewn items, etc. The products get exported to the Japan. The additional skill of weaving was added. Shakti Samuha motivates the residents for their economic empowerment. The residents are supported with different types of vocational training as per their capacity and interest that is assessed by the Case Management team. Usually, they are sent to the organizations that provide trainings in coordination. However, when it requires professional training, they are sent to different institutions outside the shelter.

We also have a small shop here in Kathmandu where we sell our products to visitors. The money that is earned in this workshop is divided between the women and girls who work there and the amount of money we need to finance this workshop and buy new materials. We are providing this training to our beneficiaries (trafficking survivor) who cannot get job in outside easily and this training help them to come out of trauma as well.

C. Prosecution

Prosecution is one of the areas of anti-trafficking intervention where a lot of emphasis and resources have been placed both globally and nationally. Even the anti-trafficking law of Nepal talks about the prosecution of traffickers with penalty and compensation for the survivors. However, in practice, most filed trafficking cases do not proceed as expected due to a lack of witness/victim protection, family pressure, and the political protection available to alleged traffickers. It has also been realized that ample time and preparation is needed to inform the trafficking survivors about the legislation, consequences and eminent threats that may ensue after they file cases against their alleged traffickers.

After receiving shelter home service, the women survivor of human trafficking get regular counseling to heal their trauma and anxieties. Similarly, Shakti Samuha never forced them to take legal process against the trafficker but prepare them by providing legal counseling to get justice by themselves. As Shakti Samuha experience during working with the survivors if they become self aware then there is less chances to hostile the cases of trafficking. Once they become firm about their decision to file the case then the likelihood of following through with the case remains strong. Since a majority of the alleged traffickers are people the survivor already knows such as relatives, neighbors or friend's fathers, it is emotionally difficult for the trafficking survivors to file a case. Strong family pressure to not file the case often compounds this further. Shakti Samuha is taking legal action with the coordination and collaboration with Forum for Protection of People's Rights (PPR) Nepal and Forum for Women, Law and Development (FWLD).

This year 5 new trafficking cases have filed and the Appeal Court and District Court of Kathmandu have made decision of 3 Trafficking in Persons (TIP) Cases. Altogether there are 45 TIP cases are running from 2010 till this date.

- Providing legal counseling
- 2 women of age 20 and 22, from boarder of Khakadhbitta has been successfully rescue in coordination with Jhapa other women networks, and Nepal police who was lured for job opportunity of foreign employment.
- Support to survivors for the birth registration and marriage registration
- Help 2 people to get Citizenship card in Bardiya District
- Success to stop the child marriage and domestic violence in working districts

D. Capacity Building

Capacity Building belongs to our beneficiaries, members (trafficking survivors) and Shakti Samuha's staffs, which has helped to enhance their capacity to empower them and for the effectiveness on the ongoing activities. Shakti Samuha has been engaging our beneficiaries and members on various types of capacity building program to boost their skill and expand knowledge. Similarly, it is to our staffs as well for the conduct of organization's activities.

Shakti Samuha has been working with women trafficking survivor's group in each working districts and conducting several capacity building activities, income generating and education support programs. Through training and orientation, trafficking survivor could understand the issue of human trafficking and could raise and add voice after getting in the problem of human trafficking, which helps to give awareness among the survivor members to protect their children from the vulnerabilities of the human trafficking and protect them from being re-victimized in their community.

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1. Income Generation (IG) Support

In this year, Shakti Samuha succeeded to support income generation to 92 members to uplift their economic status. Among the 92 Shakti Samuha has support to 33 member and 59 members are supported income generation support from the revolving fund in Jhapa and Bardiya. Shakti Samuha has succeed to support income generation for agriculture farming, goat farming, vegetable farming, pig farming, buffalo farming, tea shop, cosmetic shop, tailoring, grocery shop, candle production and another shop to sell worship materials in Kathmandu, Makwanpur, Banke, Bardiya, Kailai, Makwanpur and Jhapa Districts.



Survivor members want to do small business for income generation in their local community but to start business survivors don't have any option without taking loans in high interest. Due to lack of awareness as they don't know about loans from finance and banks and in this situation, Shakti Samuha has been supporting income generation support to the members as seed money to start their business which is very helpful for them. The amount provided through the IG support to members, there is no any mandatory to return 100% immediately or within a year but members will return the amount when they are able to pay it.

2. Education Support

Shakti Samuha has been supporting stationary materials to the children of survivor members and who are in high risk of human trafficking with low income in their family. Parents are unable to afford their children education fee and for income source children are forced in labor work which causing problem in their education. Therefore we are supporting education materials including for pen, copy, book and dress to the children. After getting help from organization, children are being able to continue their study.




Figure 9: Total number of education supported (District wise)




Figure 10: Total number of education supported in this year

E. Advocacy (Lobby & Networking)

Shakti Samuha intervened to recognize the issue of human trafficking as a human rights violation at the community and national level. Since its beginning, is actively involved in the anti-human trafficking campaigns. Similarly, Shakti Samuha has been lobbying for the positive changes in existing law and policy to get justice to the survivors and to end human trafficking. We have been adding voice to make survivor friendly environment in the country as they are subjected to humiliation, stigmatization and isolation by their own families and community people by ignoring that were forced in to the slavery.

Shakti Samuha has membership with different district, national and global level anti trafficking networks and through this network also Shakti Samuha is continuously advocating to address the issues of human trafficking and for the rights of survivor.

▪ ***National Level Workshop***

National Level Workshop (core committee discussion on Standard Operation Procedure (SOP) for repatriation of survivors has conducted as per the suggestion from the Government and the stakeholders, Meeting with pioneer stakeholders and representative from Ministry was conducted to finalize the draft of SOP, though there was raised a lot of issues and procedures should be pointed in SOP. The team including vice-Secretary of Ministry of Women Children and Social Welfare Ms. Radhika Aryal and Under-Secretary Mr. Kiran Rupakheti and Ms. Sunita Nepal, Ms. Benu Maya Gurung, Program Coordinator of AATWIN, Ms. Uma Tamang from Maiti Nepal and from other organizations. The Draft has been finalized through the core committee. And Government has been taking initiation to coordination with Indian counterpart through Ministry of Foreign Affairs.



Other Activities for Advocacy:

- Completing survey on access to justice to review the legal framework and conducting interviews with members of justice sector, social service providers, educators, and other relevant state agencies.
- Coordination meeting with stakeholders in Mumbai and Pune in India.
- Safe and voluntary repatriation protocol is increasingly recognized and respected by NGOs in India and Nepal.

Major Achievements:

- Shakti Samuha has been honored by French Republic Human Rights Award from the French Embassy in Kathmandu for anti human trafficking work in 2015.
- Founding member and President Ms. Sunita Danuwar has awarded by 2015 Asia Democracy and Human Rights Award by Taiwan Foundation in Taiwan.
- Founding member and President Ms. Sunita Danuwar has awarded by Women Leadership Achievement Award in Mumbai, India.
- Shakti Samuha has been honored by the Nari Chetana Mahila Krisak Samuha in Rautahat district on the occasion of Women's Day.
- Shakti Samuha has produced two documentaries, one documentary of trafficking survivor on repatriation process and important of Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) between two countries for repatriation process and another documentary is **Juneli "The Light"** based on a true story of a survivor.
- District level adolescent networks formulated in Kathmandu, Sindhupalchowk and Nuwakot districts.
- Adolescent members and survivor members became more active regarding their confidentiality and dignified life, also making their involvement to refer the cases regarding human trafficking and domestic violence.
- Adolescent members have been mobilizing themselves to raise awareness against the human trafficking and child sexual abuse through street drama, community cleaning program and event celebrations. Community people (such as mother's group, parents, women group, community committee etc) has been appreciating their work and supporting too. One of the adolescent groups of project areas succeeded to stop child sexual abuse in their school through street drama as they were facing problems from their teachers in school.
- One of the adolescent members from Syaule VDC became police personnel and committed to work against the human trafficking.
- Having clear concept of human trafficking, 5 advisor members from the adolescent groups, above 18 years were selected as a paid volunteer in the project areas of Kathmandu and Nuwakot district during the emergency work.



After massive Earthquake on 25th April 2015

- After the massive earthquake, adolescent members were not fell into the broker's hand with their falsify promises though the situation was dreadful as they are aware regarding the vulnerabilities of human trafficking and other kinds of violence.

- 100,909 people from the 14 most affected districts received information on human trafficking issues, 1678 children are identified from vulnerable condition and 84 children among 1978 got support.
- Supported temporary shelters to 18 households (77 individuals) of the women and girls working in entertainment sectors.
- Child Protection and Information Help Desk at Bandue, Baunepatti and Bhotechaur VDCs in Sindhupalchowk districts. Till now, 42 children are intercepted from Baunepatti and Bhotechaur VDCs.



- Established Temporary Learning Centers and Female Friendly Spaces in Nuwakot, Makwanpur and Sindhupalchowk districts.
- 5 Cross Border Workshop has successfully completed to minimize the risk of human trafficking by preventing stakeholders.



Challenges:

- Massive earthquake hit in Nepal on 25th April 2015 and because of this it was difficult to complete the target programs within its deadline and unofficial blockade by India has been adding more difficulties.
- After earthquake trafficker and agents became more active and luring women and girls with false promises and opportunities.
- Traffickers from the prison were escaped during the massive earthquake and giving threat to the family members of the survivors.
- Still Social Stigmatization/Discrimination has been existing in the community and difficulties have seen for the survivors to reintegrate in the community.
- Trafficking survivors who have been rescued with babies and received rehabilitation services, it has seen big challenge for us to reintegrate them in the community and to provide the citizenship card to the babies.
- Efforts and work of Government is very slow to finalize the draft protocol of repatriation though we are doing lobby and advocacy for it (but now the process is in pause, because of the earthquake). And it's quite difficult to do coordination with Governmental Organization.
- Emerging trend of Human Trafficking.
- Threats come from the Trafficker.
- Long term Support to the survivors.
- Fund Crisis.



Best Practices/Learning:

- It is very effective to organize awareness activity to survivors in initiations of adolescent groups.
- The number of Trafficking in entertainment sector and trafficking from Entertainment sector to Dubai, Qatar, Tanzania, and Kenya is being increased; we should Specific our plan in Commercial Sexual Exploitation on Child (CSEC) and should raise awareness in Prevention thematic area about CSEC also.
- Wall magazine and IEC material is the best tool for effective communication.
- In Bara and Rautahat Districts, the Sex work at the hotels of high way and at the bank of the jungle of high way is still founded. Another part, the place is also being developed as a transit point of trafficking, the local women who are involved in sex work, lured to adolescents to do such work. It should be studied from the grass root level from the CSEC angle.
- Phase out plan along sustainability plan should be designed in every running projects.

- As in the project there is limited budget for the event celebration, the learning is that the cost need to be increased to increase group mobilization and to work effectively in coordination with other organizations.
- To access on local resources adolescent and survivor groups should be sensitized regarding the resource mobilization in upcoming days

Extra Activities of Shakti Samuha in 2015 year

- ***Social Audit Program***

Shakti Samuha organized Social audit program on 29th December 2015 at Sap-Falchha, Kathmandu. The main objective to organize this program is to measure, understand, report and ultimately improve an organization's social and ethical performance. It is also important for transparency. Therefore, Shakti Samuha has been organizing Social Audit program annually at the last month of year.

All together 83 people participated in the program from working districts of Shakti Samuha. There were the participants from the governmental and non-governmental organization, human trafficking survivors' group/networks, adolescents groups, Women Protection Committee, journalist, donors, and beneficiaries, members of Shakti Samuha and well-wisher of the organization.
